Following Their Passions


What do an author, a hospice director, and a marketing coordinator for a professional sports team have in common?

Answer: All three are alumni of Perrysburg Schools!

The Author

Many people dream of writing and publishing a book, but 1965 Perrysburg High School graduate Sally (Sluhan) Wright acted on her dreams. Wright is the author of six mystery novels featuring the fictional Ben Reese, a 30-something university archivist who had been a World War II Scout. During the war, the American Army employed highly trained scouts to sneak behind enemy lines and conduct clandestine reconnaissance missions. In her mystery novel series, Wright's fictional character uses those reconnaissance skills to investigate murders that take place in the 1960's. "I started writing the Ben Reese books after I'd badgered an archivist into telling me what he'd done in the war," says Wright. "His work during the war was dangerous and very secretive, but his present day job of chronicling old books, paintings, sculptures and other items was much less stressful. The contrast between his two lives compelled me to create a

fictional character that paralleled the real-life person." Wright's Ben Reese series began in 1997 and includes six books: *Publish and Perish*, *Pride and Predator*, *Pursuit of Persuasion*, *Out of the Ruins*, and *Watches of the Night*. Her sixth and newest book in the series, *Code of Silence*, revolves around a real-life, unbreakable secret Soviet code and its use and implications during the Cold War. *Pursuit and Persuasion* was a 2001 Finalist in the Mystery Writers of America Edgar Allan Poe Award competition. Wright is known for her comprehensive research before writing a book, which involves traveling, interviewing and even living the lives of her characters. "It takes me two years to research and write a book in order to do it the way I want it done," says Wright. Her books are set in a variety of places: England; Scotland; Lexington, Kentucky; a small college town in Ohio; the southeastern coast of America; parts of North Carolina; and various cities in Italy. Book reviewers usually compare Wright's work to that of Agatha Christie, Dorothy Sayers, Josephine Tey, Margery Allingham, and Ngaio Marsh. Wright says her literary influences include Sayers, Marsh, Tolstoy, Jane Austen and especially C.S. Lewis. "I was born obsessed with books, and my ambition to write novels dates back to when I was six-years-old," she says. "But it was Nancy Henry Mason, my 5th and 6th grade teacher at Pine Street Elementary (now Frank Elementary), who really understood my passion. She encouraged me – and the entire class – to read, write and to understand art and literature." After graduating from Perrysburg High School, Wright earned a degree in oral interpretation of literature from Northwestern University. She moved on to the University of Washington for graduate work, and then began writing and publishing many biographical articles for national and local magazines. Wright plans to author one more Ben Reese novel to complete the series and is working on a new series of books that will feature a group of different characters. The Hospice Director

Helping patients have quality of life at the end of life has become the personal mission of Judy (Moulton) Seibenick, RN, BSN, MOL. A 1974 graduate of Perrysburg High School, Seibenick is the Executive Director of Hospice of Northwest Ohio. Her educational career included Pine Street Elementary School (now Frank Elementary), Perrysburg Junior High, as well as Perrysburg High School. She played the flute and was active in the high school marching and concert bands. She also swam competitively for the Glass City Swim Club (Perrysburg High School did not have a swim team at that time). Seibenick then moved on to Bowling Green State University where she graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Nursing in 1979. After graduating from college, Seibenick began working as an in-home hospice nurse for Visiting Nurse Service of Toledo, where she remained until 1984 when she

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continued her in-home hospice work for the newly formed Northwest Ohio Hospice Association. "Back then several influential people got together and decided that the city of Toledo and its surrounding suburbs needed a hospice organization," says Seibenick. "I was fortunate to join the organization in its early days." In 1995 the organization's name was changed to Hospice of Northwest Ohio, and it was then that its first building was constructed on East River Road in Perrysburg. Seibenick began to assume more managerial roles in the organization, and in 2000 she was named the Executive Director of Hospice of Northwest Ohio. In 2004 she led the opening of a second building – the Virginia Clifford Hospice Center on Detroit Avenue in Toledo. In 2008 the organization opened a third facility – an office – in Lambertville, Michigan that provides in-home hospice care to southeastern Michigan residents. Today, Seibenick is in charge of over 500 employees, two onsite hospice centers that total 49 beds, and one home hospice care office. Each year Hospice of Northwest Ohio cares for thousands of patients in their final days of life. "There is a lot of living that happens in the final months, weeks, and days of a person's life," says Seibenick, "and I have been privileged to have helped families at that important time in their lives." There are several other Perrysburg High School graduates who are key staff members at Hospice of Northwest Ohio: Susan (Dowling) Beasecker ('73), a team leader; Judy (Yunk) Lang ('71), the Director of Public Relations; Amey (Inclendon) Raihala ('74), RN, Team Leader; and Sue (Hoffman) Grames ('74), a dietary staff member. The Sports Marketer

What does it feel like to win the Stanley Cup? "It was pretty awesome," says Sarah Swartz, Marketing Coordinator for the Pittsburgh Penguins National Hockey League team. Swartz's Penguins beat the Detroit Red Wings, four games to three, to win the Stanley Cup at the conclusion of the 2008-09 season. "When we won, we got to celebrate with the team on the ice after game seven, ride on a float in the celebration parade and even receive a Stanley Cup ring." So how does a 1999 graduate of Perrysburg High School end up in marketing for a professional sports team? "It all started with me being an athlete," says Swartz, who played high school soccer for four years, including two years as a member of the varsity team. "I've always been interested in sports, especially soccer, so I decided to pursue a degree in Sports Marketing." Swartz attend Bowling Green State University where she played club soccer for four years and was involved in the Sport Management Alliance Club. She graduated in 2004 from BGSU with a Bachelor of Science in Education as a Sports Management major and a minor in Marketing. While attending college Swartz had a paid internship in Marketing for the Columbus Clippers (2001) and the Toledo Mud Hens (2003) minor league baseball teams. In 2004 she interned with Major League Soccer (MLS) in New York City, where she was involved in special events and the All-Star game. That year Swartz landed her first full-time job working for a marketing/promotional agency that handled in-store promotions for a major consumer goods manufacturer. "It was interesting and I loved designing promotions, but I missed being around sports," says Swartz. In 2006 she joined Pittsburgh Penguins as an Account Executive in

Group Sales. She assumed her current role as a Marketing Coordinator for the Penguins in 2007 and is responsible for developing game-day promotional giveaways. "I came up with the idea to combine our promotional products, such as winter scarves and knit caps, and gear them towards the Winter Classic colors - the outdoor hockey game between the Penguins and the Washington Capitals at Heinz Field on January 1st," says Swartz. "It's a fun job that has great perks and it's a place where I can be creative that I enjoy," says Swartz. "There are a lot of devoted Penguin fans, and for some of them attending a game is a dream come true. That makes my job even more special when I know I am helping to enhance that game-day experience for them." Swartz's long-term goal is to return to her first love, soccer, and work in some capacity for a team or the league in special events and promotions. The Varsity Jacket: A Story of Giving



This story began over 40 years ago with a young, 10th grade Perrysburg High School student and track athlete named Rogelio “Roger” Flores. Flores was the son of immigrants who were natives of Mexico. In 1969 he earned his first Varsity Letter in Cross Country. As a proud athlete, he wanted to wear a varsity jacket just like the other athletes. Unfortunately, his parents couldn’t afford to purchase one. That’s when the Perrysburg Lions Club became part of the story. The club heard about Flores’ situation and decided to purchase a jacket for him. Flores wore his varsity jacket proudly throughout the remainder of his Perrysburg High School career until he graduated in 1971. He now lives in California, and the well-worn and tattered varsity jacket that was given to him back in the 10th grade, still hangs in his closet. In the back of his mind, Flores always knew he wanted to “pay it forward” and return the favor, but he didn’t know when or how the opportunity would present itself. While he was packing for a recent move he saw his prized jacket once again, and a flood of great memories returned. It was at that moment that he realized what he wanted to do. Flores began by contacting the Perrysburg Lions Club, and he coincidentally connected with fellow classmate Charles Hablitzel, Jr., a PHS

Counselor, Head Golf Coach and a member of the Perrysburg Lions Club.

“That varsity jacket gave me a sense of belonging that I cannot explain,” says Flores. “Life has been very good to me, and I know that being raised in Perrysburg and attending Perrysburg High School influenced and shaped me in a way that still affects me today. That varsity jacket was a part of it! So, I decided to return the wonderful and generous experience that the Perrysburg Lions Club graced me with 40 years ago by giving a financially needy Perrysburg High School student a varsity jacket. I did not want to place a lot of restrictions on the recipient. I just wanted it to go to a good kid, a Junior or Senior, who is proud to represent PHS in any sport, and whose parents cannot afford to buy him or her a varsity jacket.” With the help of Hablitzel, the Lions Club, and Perrysburg Schools Athletic Director Ray Pohlman, a student was chosen, and a new varsity jacket was presented ... thanks to Rogelio “Roger” Flores.

“This is one of the most generous gifts that I have witnessed in the 33 years that I’ve been at Perrysburg High School,” says Hablitzel. “The student that received this jacket may never fully realize just how special it is, or maybe they will understand ... and decide to return the gesture years down the road.”

ENRICHING THE EDUCATIONAL EXPERIENCE

The Perrysburg Schools Foundation is made up of community business leaders and school supporters for the purpose of encouraging excellence and enriching the educational experiences of Perrysburg students. It is a separate entity from the Perrysburg School District. The Foundation awards mini-grants in the elementary, junior high and high schools for extras ranging from ukuleles for elementary music classes to advanced placement study materials for high school students. Along with granting upwards of \$15,000 in scholarships to graduating seniors at an annual awards night, it also honors teachers and support staff across the district, and additionally presents an award to an outstanding alumna or alumnus.

ATHLETIC DEPARTMENT RECEIVES DONATIONS FOR BASEBALL FIELD

Two generous donations have been made to jumpstart the new baseball field, which will be located at Perrysburg High School. Jim Leyland ('62), Perrysburg native and Manager of the Detroit Tigers, and his family – wife Katie, son Patrick and daughter Kellie – have made a commitment to donate \$100,000 to fund a portion of the project. Burke Badenhop ('01), a pitcher for the Florida Marlins, has made a commitment to donate \$5,000 to fund a portion of the project. “We are delighted that two of our outstanding alumni have made this commitment,” says Superintendent Tom Hosler. “We can't thank Mr. Badenhop and Mr. Leyland and his family enough for such a generous tribute to their alma mater.” The field will be located in the southwest corner of the athletic complex located off of Fort Meigs Road. “Over the last six years, the Perrysburg Athletic Boosters have been preparing the high school site and have contributed over \$200,000 in fieldwork such as surveying, land preparation, drainage, and well irrigation,” explains Ray Pohlman, Perrysburg Schools' Athletic Director. “With these contributions, our hopes are that we can blend private and public dollars to accomplish this project,” Hosler says. “Given the current economic climate, we are beginning to rely on this type of arrangement more and more.”





BOYCE NAMED COACH OF THE YEAR



Dave Boyce, Perrysburg High School Assistant Principal and Head Boys Basketball Coach, was named the Ohio High School Basketball Coaches Association's (OHSBCA) 2010 Division I Coach of the Year. "Dave not only understands the X's and O's of basketball, but more importantly he knows people," says PHS

Principal Dr. Michael Short. "We are so proud of Coach Boyce," adds Superintendent Tom Hosler. "We've known him to be an excellent coach and strong administrator, so it is very gratifying to see him honored for his hard work by his peers. Coach Boyce's teams play above their abilities. They exhibit great heart, integrity and sportsmanship – qualities that I see in their head coach." Through the 2009-2010 season, Coach Boyce's Perrysburg boys teams have a combined record of 172-46. His teams have earned seven NLL titles, one District Championship and have been ranked as high as #3 in the State AP poll. Coach Boyce has been named District Coach of the Year six times and AP Coach of the Year once during his career. He has coached at Perrysburg for the past 10 years.

HILT ATTENDS WORLD CONGRESS IN INDONESIA



Before the start of this school year, Perrysburg Junior High Social Studies Teacher Bill Hilt was hard at work on the Perrysburg Global Initiative. Hilt joined approximately 200 participants from 58 countries and 30 states in the CIVITAS World Congress on Civic Education in Jakarta, Indonesia. The

theme of the July 23-27, 2010 Congress was Embracing Diversity and Building Unity through Civic Education. Participants also enjoyed Indonesian cultural performances throughout the conference. "I was really amazed with the quality of the program and the hard work and dedication exhibited by the Center for Civic Education to put such a valuable conference together," says Hilt. "Teachers in Ohio have a great opportunity to collaborate with partners on a global scale, to bring 21st Century skills into the classroom." Hilt founded the Perrysburg Global Initiative in 2009 and led the implementation of the school district's Global Summit for the last two years, served on the planning committee and presented an overview of the Global Summit at the ODE Global Institute at Ohio State University August 3-5, 2010. At the World Congress, Mr. Hilt represented the Ohio partnership, administered through The University of Toledo's Dr. Leigh Chiarelott, director, and Dr. Victoria Stewart. The Ohio partnership includes partners in Poland, Ukraine, Morocco and South Africa. Domestic partners include Missouri, Kentucky and Alabama. CIVITAS International Programs are directed by the Center for Civic Education and funded by the U.S. Department of Education. Hilt has participated in teacher exchanges through the partnerships in Ukraine 2006 and Morocco 2008. Perrysburg Junior High has hosted school visits for international partnership educators on several occasions since 2005.

Using Technology To Enrich The Student Experience

Students in the EXCELS gifted programs at Woodland and Toth Elementary Schools have used Skype to videoconference with Marcia Myers, a teacher in South Carolina, who retired from Perrysburg Schools last year. "She has given us critical thinking problems to work on, and recently we were playing a game with her to review math concepts," explains Jeanna Boes, Gifted Intervention Specialist, Toth and Woodland Elementary Schools.

In addition, Boes and Julie Twining, 4th Grade Teacher at Woodland, have connected with a school in Toujia, Taiwan to write pen pal letters in order to share cultural information. The teachers are

working with Sara Kurtz, who was one of the district's intervention teachers a few years ago. Kurtz now teaches in Taiwan. "We're using a very interesting document share system that is being used by the school in Taiwan," explains Twining. "Our class has been able to view pictures of their town, PowerPoint® presentations of their school, and more. Meanwhile, my class just completed their first iMovie® about Woodland School. It turned out really good. The students did every part of the movie and took all of the photos. Our next project will be another iMovie about the students in my class." Twining says the project's goal is to enrich student learning by integrating technology and cultural/international studies into her class.
