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The SUMMER 08 Latest Busz A Living Classroom PERRYSBURG SCHOOLS ALUMNI NEWSLETTER

At the beginning of the next school year, Perrysburg High School will offer students a real-life lab experiment right outside its doors. Thanks to the combined efforts of students and staff, the high school is developing a wetlands green space on one acre of the school's campus, between the apartment complex and the teachers' parking lot.

The proposed project will be a seasonal wetland, disappearing in the summer when it is dry. Dry weather and the introduction of mosquito-eating insects will help to control the mosquito population in the area. During wet seasons, the water will be six inches to two feet deep in two areas. Biology teacher Kevin English and other science department faculty members have been working on the project with the Wood County Soil and Water Conservation District and the Wood County Park District.

"I've wanted to do this since we moved into the building," said Mr. English. "Hudson High School has a great outdoor campus. After seeing it we put our heads together, did some research, and found out it wasn't nearly as costly as we had thought." The total estimated cost is \$2,000. Ninety percent of the cost involves moving the dirt,

and Perrysburg resident Gary Bowers, of Bowers Asphalt & Paving, volunteered to move all the dirt for free. Last fall Mr. Bowers was instrumental in putting in the walking track at Toth Elementary School.

Primarily ecology and Advanced Placement AP) biology classes will use the wetlands. Students in those classes have learned that nearly 1/3 of Ohio's endangered and threatened wildlife species live in wetland habitats. Over 33% of Ohio's wildlife species depend on wetlands for survival.

The design for the project came from a competition held by Perrysburg ecology classes, with senior Kyle Bonner winning. "Wood County also came up with a design for us," noted High School Principal Mike Short. "So the final design is a combination of the two, because they had some requirements that we were not aware of. The students are working now on what to plant and what kind of wildlife we want to attract. It will all be native to the area."

Mr. English said students would also help to maintain the wetlands. Future projects include water quality testing, dissolved oxygen testing and macro invertebrate surveying. Mr. English said he would like to open the wetlands for other groups to use, including Perrysburg elementary schools, the junior high and the public.

For Mr. English and Mr. Short, the project is the culmination of a long-held vision of providing the best possible learning environment for Perrysburg science students. "This is kind of a living textbook," commented Mr. Short. "It is absolutely the best kind of hands-on tool. It's one thing to read about it; it's another to actually experience it."

The school is seeking donations for the remainder of the project, including funds for boots, nets and lumber for bat boxes and bird feeders. When I took over as Superintendent of Perrysburg Schools in August of 2007, one of my goals was to connect with our alumni. the athletic complex vision. The Ken Widdel family donation of \$500,000 (see related article) brought that total to \$700,000 and kicked off the next phase of the Perrysburg Schools athletic complex capital campaign.

Through a combination of private donations and permanent improvement funds, the school district has already replaced the track at Steinecker Stadium at the beginning of the school year. It will soon open a soccer field at

the high school, and several future athletic fields on the high school's campus have been cleaned, graded and seeded. The next phase of the plan is to build a new track, tennis courts as well as baseball and softball diamonds on the new high school campus. The timing for this work will be determined by the timing and amount of private donations collected.
