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#### COUNSELOR'S CORNER

Studies show the rise of the use of cell phones contributes to several related harms in the daily lives of smartphone users, including social deprivation, sleep deprivation, and attention fragmentation. For students, these harms may contribute to an increase in youth mental

health concerns and have negative impacts on academic performance. Youth mental health symptoms and disorders continue to rise at concerning levels in the United States, with at least 1 in 5 children reporting mental, emotional, developmental, or behavioral disorders.

In the United States, 95% of teens (children ages 13 to 17) have access to smart cell phones. Students, on average, receive 192 alerts per day from their cell phones, about 11 notifications per waking hour, one every five minutes. Cell phones and their applications are designed to catch the attention of students, which is disruptive to both learning and relationships. Even when students do not check their cell phones, the presence of a phone impacts their ability to think.

#### **Cell Phones in Ohio Schools**

Ohio law now requires all schools to adopt a policy governing the use of cell phones by students during school hours. Our policy summary may be found in our handbook at this link: <u>https://tinyurl.com/yrmatbx5</u>.

#### FROM THE NURSE

## Are you ready to fight the flu this season?

The best protection against the flu is getting the flu vaccine.

#### What is the flu?

Influenza (flu) is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infect the nose, throat, and sometimes the lungs. It can cause mild to severe illness, and at times can lead to death.

#### What are flu symptoms?

Flu symptoms are different from a cold. Flu usually comes on suddenly.

People who have the flu often have some of all of these symptoms.

- Fever or feeling feverish/chills it is important to note not everyone has a fever
- Cough
- Sore throat
- Runny/stuffy nose
- Muscle or body aches
- Headaches
- Fatigue
- Some people may have vomiting and diarrhea

#### How does the flu spread?

Most experts believe that flu viruses spread mainly by tiny droplets made when people with flu cough, sneeze, or talk. These droplets can land in the mouth or nose of people who are nearby. A person might get the flu by touching a surface or objects that have the flu virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose, or eyes (the T-Zone).

#### **Period of Contagiousness**

People with the flu virus are most contagious in the first 3-4 days after the illness begins.

#### **Preventing Seasonal Flu**

The CDC recommends getting the flu vaccine every year. The CDC also recommends everyday preventive actions like staying away from people who are sick.

- Stay home from school if you are sick. This will help the spread of the illnesses!
- Cover your cough or sneezes (do not use your hands).
- Frequently washing your hands will help slow down the spread of germs.
- Do not put your fingers in your eyes, nose or mouth.

Throughout the fall months at PJHS, our Student Council has been working on many exciting and student-led events. One of these big events is our Veterans Day assembly. We look forward to honoring our men and women who represent our country as some of the strongest and bravest people we know. The Veterans Day assembly was held on November 7th where our family veterans were invited to celebrate their dedication.

#### **MOCK TRIAL**

Off and running, the mock trial students have been busy learning about the trial process. They've discussed the roles of judges, prosecutors, defense attorneys, witnesses, and bailiffs. They will soon learn how to maneuver the rules of evidence and raise objections.

Based on the book, The Witch of Blackbird Pond, and set in the Connecticut Colony, this year's case finds co-defendants Goodwife Cruff and Goodman Cruff charged with attempted murder, arson, and criminal mischief. Surprisingly, two of the witnesses - widow Hannah Tupper and teenager Kit Tyler – had been suspected of witchcraft, but they are not the ones facing trial. As the students are learning, the prosecution bears the heavy burden of proving each and every element of the offenses beyond a reasonable doubt. To do so, prosecution attorneys will call three witnesses to the stand. And the defense attorneys will then call their three witnesses. All six witnesses not only testify on direct examination, but then face cross-examination by the opposing side's attorneys.

The team will meet on Monday afternoons from 2:50 - 5:00pm, in room 209 to prepare for the Middle School Mock Trial Showcase, which takes place in the spring at the Thomas J. Moyer Ohio Judicial Center in downtown Columbus. At the Showcase, hosted by the Ohio Center for Law Related Education, the Perrysburg Junior High School teams will compete against teams from across Ohio. Retired Judge S. Dwight Osterud started PJHS's mock trial program over ten years ago.



The PJHS Girls STEM club, in conjunction with NASA, is actively participating in a research project called Growing Beyond Earth. Our active research site is housing three different varieties of food sources that are grown in harsh conditions to determine the overall adaptation capability and success rate of each species. The girls maintain controlled variables and report back data on growth, levels, and other factors supporting the discovery of viable food options as we continue to investigate and explore opportunities to colonize the Moon, Mars, and beyond. What an exciting time to be in STEM-related research and fields.

If we are not helping to colonize foreign excursions, we

are planning a mural design for our prairie. Much research and resources have already been considered on a massive scale to incorporate the love and techniques of art into this STEM project. We thank everyone who is on board to support our PJHS Girls STEM club members!






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#### WHERE EVERYONE BELONGS (WEB) PROGRAM
