LETTER FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear PJHS Families,

Our Second Semester has begun at PJHS and we continue to look forward to what that brings to our students and school community. It also is hard to believe that we are already looking ahead to next year and the transitions your student is making, whether it be to 8th or 9th grade.

We would like to pause for a moment and reflect back on our First Semester, highlighted by our student achievements in the classroom and outside of it. Our students are achieving at a high academic rate with over 85% of the students achieving an Honors Recognition for Quarter 1 and then 75% of the students receiving an Honors Recognition for Quarter 2. Over 85% of our students are testing at or above national norms in the STAR Math Assessment while 71% of our students are meeting that standard on the STAR English Language Arts Assessment. Our attendance rate at PJHS for the First Semester was just under 94% and we are extremely proud to share that 68% of our students are involved in at least one school sponsored team, club or activity. We were moved by our students' participation in our Silent Night Teddy Bear Toss at our December 13 boys basketball games against Anthony Wayne in which students tossed over 200 teddy bears onto the court to be donated to Toys for Tots.

Our Jacket Way Program continues to reinforce positive student behaviors. At the end of the First Semester, 72% of our students had received at least one Jacket Way Ticket and our positive

referral to negative referral ratio was 14:1.

We continue to look forward to building on our student achievement and experience through the Second Semester. On January 19, our student body was treated to a special theatrical presentation of *Letters from Anne and Martin*, which saw two actors portraying Anne Frank and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. sharing parallel experiences from their lives. We have planned a Military Appreciation Night during a girls home basketball game, a Student Council "Lock-In" and the return of the PJHS Annual Dodgeball Tournament that will take place in February.

As we look forward to the 2023 - 2024 school year, we are busy working with schedule requests for incoming 7th and 8th grade students. Our current 8th grade students are working with our high school student services department with their registration for freshman year. On April 28, all of our 8th grade students will be attending Perrysburg High School to participate in their annual "FroshFest," during which the students will be able to experience the school, talk to current students and see the different extracurricular activities that PHS offers.

Once again, thank you for your continued support of your students and our PJHS community.

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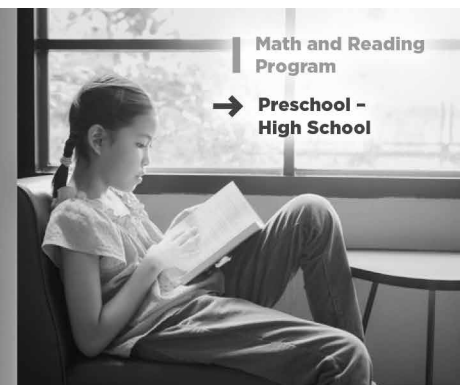

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"LETTERS FROM ANNE AND MARTIN" PERFORMANCE

PJHS had the opportunity to see the performance *Letters from Anne and Martin* on Thursday, January 19. During this performance, two actors portraying Anne Frank and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., read excerpts from *Anne Frank's The Diary of a Young Girl* and Dr. King's *Letter from Birmingham Jail*.

A Student's Reflection on the Performance of Letters from Anne and Martin

On Thursday January 19, 2023 PJHS had the wonderful opportunity to view a professional program "Letters from Anne and Martin" from the Anne Frank Center in New York.

Anne Frank was a young Jewish girl who lived at the time of the Holocaust. She, like many other girls her age, was concerned with boys and dreading math. But her life took a turn when Hitler invaded Poland and her father decided to hide her and her family in a secret annex behind his office. While in hiding Anne wrote a diary in which she kept all of her secrets and feelings about the world around her. She and her family were later found and Anne died in a concentration camp months later, Her father being the only one to survive granted Anne's wish and published her diary.

Martin Luther King Jr. was a Civil Rights activist who is most famous for his leadership during this time period in the United States. His most famous line was "I have a dream." During a peaceful protest he and other activists were arrested in Birmingham Alabama. He was sent to prison which is where he writes his famous "Letters from a Birmingham Jail." He later was released. After years of work Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was assassinated on April 4, 1968.

voices of Anne and Martin. The performance was about the parallel thoughts that both Martin Luther King Jr. and Anne Frank had. The production started off with special audio effects that perfectly portrayed the horrors of each of the characters' time periods. Throughout the performance both of the characters thoughts were perfectly woven together into one very impressive and impactful script. A similarity between Anne and Martin that most people don't know about is that they were both born in the same year, 1929. Most people don't associate the Holocaust with the Civil Rights movement, and though they did live very different lives both of them faced many similar challenges including injustice, discrimination, and prejudice against their race and culture. Both historical figures impacted their societies for the better with their sublime and remarkable writing.

As an 8th grader, this performance gave me a deeper understanding of how these people that were being oppressed found joy in the little things in life. It also helps me understand to not take the little things for granted, things like being able to have the same freedoms as everyone else. This was a truly remarkable performance I hope to never forget.

Are You Ready to Fight the Flu This Season?

The best protection against the flu is getting the flu vaccine.

What is the Flu?

Influenza (flu) is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infect the nose, throat and sometimes the lungs. It can cause mild to severe illness, and at times can lead to death.

What Are Flu Symptoms?

Flu symptoms are different from a cold. Flu usually comes on suddenly.

People who have the flu often have some of all of these symptoms.

- Fever or feeling feverish/chills. It is important to note not everyone has a fever.
- Cough
- Sore throat
- Runny/stuffy nose
- Muscle or body aches
- Headaches
- Fatigue
- Some people may have vomiting and diarrhea

How Does the Flu Spread?

Most experts believe that flu viruses spread mainly by tiny droplets made when people with flu cough, sneeze or talk. These droplets may land in the mouth or nose of people who are nearby. A person might get the flu by touching a surface or objects that has the flu virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose or eyes (the T-Zone).

Period of Contagiousness

People with the flu virus are most contagious in the first 3-4 days after the illness begins.

Preventing Seasonal Flu

The CDC recommends getting the flu vaccine every year. The CDC also recommends everyday preventive actions, such as:

- Staying away from people who are sick.
- Staying home from school if you are sick. This will help the spread of the illness!
- Cover your cough or sneezes (do not use your hands).
- Frequently washing your hands will help slow down the spread of germs.
- Do not put your fingers in your eyes, nose or mouth.
