This past school year has been tremendous for our students, staff members, families and our PJHS community. Both grades successfully navigated Ohio State Testing in April by taking assessments in English Language Arts and Mathematics, plus Science for our 8th grade students. We are awaiting results from these assessments as those will be coming during our summer months.

Our PJHS Band Program put a new twist on their annual Band on the Run at Levis Commons, turning this event into an evening Glow Run. They fought off some earlier storms and rains to have a successful first run at this and we look forward to building on it in the future. Both our boys and girls Jacket Track and Field Teams claimed NLL Championships and we had several athletes qualify to the Junior High State Track and Field Championships in May. At our Spring Spirit Assembly, we recognized students in all of our extracurricular activities, which continue to grow in number and student participation.

The year concluded with us being honored to present Outstanding Students in all of the content areas and our Portrait of a Jacket Nominees at our morning recognition ceremonies and then recognizing all 8th grade students rising to 9th grade at the evening recognition ceremony at Perrysburg High School. On the last day of school, students were treated to our annual PJHS Talent Show that featured various musical acts, dance routines, artwork and even a performance from the PJHS teacher band, *The Clipboards*.

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COMMUNITY EVENT AT PJHS

Holocaust Survivor Dr. Irene Butter recently spoke at Perrysburg Junior High School to over 200 members in attendance in which she shared her personal story of living through and surviving the Holocaust. Dr. Butter was born in Berlin, Germany in 1930 but fled to Amsterdam, Holland in 1937 with her family to escape Hitler and the Nazi Regime. In June 1943, the family was deported first to Westerbork, a transit camp, and then in February 1944, to a German concentration camp, Bergen-Belsen, where a large number of inmates died from terrorist practices including slave labor, malnutrition and epidemics. She is one of the last known people alive today to have made personal contact with Anne Frank, who was in an adjacent section of the camp. Irene shared her story of survival including how her family managed to be included in a rare exchange of German citizens and prisoners of war for Jews who had obtained South and Central American passports. On the second night of the Red Cross Train transport towards freedom in January 1945, her father died from the torture and starvation suffered in the camps. Dr. Butter, age 14, was then separated from her surviving mother and brother and deported to North Africa to a refugee camp. Eighteen months later, the three were reunited in New York City and began their new life in America.

The visit to the Perrysburg community was in addition to her meeting with the 450+ 8th grade students at the Jr. High earlier in March as part of the English Language Arts curriculum on the Holocaust.

"Each year, we spend time building background knowledge about the Holocaust; learning about propaganda and the rise of Nazi Germany, 'walking in the shoes' of survivors by reading Gerda Weissmann Klein's excerpt from *All But My Life* and Elie Wiesel's memoir *Night*," explained Megan Helman, Perrysburg Junior High School English Teacher. "Students were also required to select an independent reading book about this time period to help enhance their learning and understanding. Many of our students will also attend the eighth grade Washington D.C. trip in June, where they will tour the Holocaust Memorial Museum. We find that our students are very much engaged and interested in learning about this time period. Their thinking is changed and challenged, while also finding connection with these personal stories. Dr. Butter's personal story brought this unit of study to a meaningful close by offering hope amongst some of the darkest times. She truly is a blessing!"

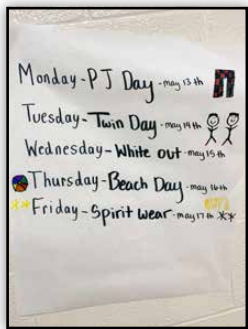


STUDENT COUNCIL

GIRLS IN STEM

Girls in STEM enjoyed a day at The Ohio University, Gibraltar Island, Ohio. For well over 100 years, the island has boasted a rich history and invaluable freshwater biology lab. Their Stone Laboratory opened its doors to analyzing Lake Erie water qualities, investigative practices into anatomy of both invasive and natural invertebrates, glacial groove inspections, orthology walks and microorganisms revealed its population size of both zooplankton and phytoplankton.



Did you know:

- Lake Erie has approximately 20 islands depending upon water levels.
- Lake Erie produces more fish for human consumption than all other Great Lakes put together.
- Lake Erie circulates each water droplet once per 2.6 years, offering the shortest retention time over the other lakes. Lake Superior, for contrast, has a retention rate of 191 years! This makes studying freshwater ecosystems much more timely in Lake Erie.
- Ships loaded in the Great Lakes will rise 15-18 cm upon entering the ocean due to the ocean's density.
- Speaking of density - freezing temperatures of salt water is lower than fresh water - ocean temperatures must dip to 28 degrees Fahrenheit before freezing.

STUDENT REFLECTIONS FROM THE DIVERSITY PROGRAM

"I really enjoyed my time at the Diversity trip! Erika Gold's story was exciting to hear and I really learned a lot about the Holocaust outside of the Concentration Camp. I thought it was funny whenever her ice cream story was brought up, she would make us laugh every time! Her story was so emotional, how her dad had to leave, but it was also hopeful and optimistic, how she escaped the cattle car and ran to the housekeeper's house to hide in the closet from the Nazis. I am truly inspired by her story and learned that it is never good to be a bystander and instead be an upstander, to call out anything that seems wrong. I thought the slideshow was cool because the papers and photos really helped fill in any blanks people might have had before hearing her story. Overall, I would go to hear another Holocaust survivor if I had the chance because Erika Gold showed us exactly what that Elie Wiesel quote said, how if witnesses tell witnesses their story, the listener will then become another witness. Thank you for allowing me to come on this field trip, I really enjoyed it!" - Brayden Linkes

"I had the special experience of going to the Diversity program. This program was hosted at the Valentine Theater in Toledo, Ohio. Students from schools all over the area attended this impactful event and loved it all so much. The speaker, Erika Gold, did an amazing job telling her fascinating story. She grew up during the time of the holocaust as a Jewish girl. The Holocaust was the genocide of European Jews during World War 2. Between 1941 and 1945, Nazi Germany and its collaborators systematically murdered around six million Jews across German-occupied Europe, which was two-thirds of Europe's Jewish population. This is a time in history that the world will always look down upon in shame. Erika's story captivated the audience, making everyone desire to know what happened next. Her story was sorrowful, with lots of loss and tragedy. Her story was a true inspiration to me and something I will never forget." - Tessa Parker
